NSW Rugby League, NSW Touch Football, Physical Disability RL, Sport for All, Sport NSW, NSW Department of Sport & Recreation have combined re- sources to form the first ever Premier Inclusive League (PIL). This league will run under NSW Touch Football and be part of the main stream Vawdon Cup competition. In the first year starting at 7:30pm Friday Night on August 5th at a venue still to be named 4 inclusive teams from Hills, Manly, Wests & Penrith

Touch Football clubs. The league will be made up from players with disabilities including low vision, deafness, CP, ID, Amputee & Physical Medical.

A team of Vision based players will represent Wests Magpies and you can get the sign up form link by emailing Blind Sports NSW. Registration will likely be \$80 per player plus uniform, Blind Sports NSW will look to subsidize some of this cost for players with a vision impairment that want to play. This is a mixed league for men & women aged 14+.

A free junior disability sport showcase hosted by Sporting Wheelies and Disabled Association has helped families to identify opportunities for their children to get active and healthy.

The event was held at the Bowen Hills YMCA in Brisbane on 22 March, and invited children with a physical disability or a vision impairment to come along and have some fun.

Participants got to spend time with coaches for boccia, goalball, gymnastics, wheelchair basketball, and wheelchair rugby, and were encouraged to join in on current programs for each sport. Sport and Recreation Manager David Bartholomaeus said the event provided а valuable opportunity for children and parents to find out about opportunities to get involved in fun activities and to meet coaches.

"We know that parents want their kids to be healthy and active, so this showcase was all about allowing kids to try a number of fun sports, and parents seeing their kids in action," said David.

"We also wanted to provide parents with the opportunity to talk to coaches and our staff about how their kids can get involved in any sports they enjoyed, as well as find out about what other opportunities are out there such as our free LinkUp advisory service RecUnlimited and our rehabilitation NeuroMoves programs."

2018 Commonwealth Games to set new benchmark for parasport inclusion

Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games organisers have announced that the event will feature the largest para-sport program in Games history.

State Minister for the Commonwealth Games Stirling Hinchcliffe joined para-athletes including Queensland's Brenden Hall, Rowan Crothers and Sara Tait at an event in Brisbane's South Bank on 14 March to announce details of the record-breaking program.

The sports to be contested are athletics, swimming, lawn bowls, powerlifting, track cycling, table tennis and triathlon.

"Gold Coast 2018 is going for gold to deliver an inclusive Games," Mr Hinchliffe said.

"We will be setting a new record in Commonwealth Games sporting history, hosting up to 300 parasport athletes and 38 medal events across seven sports, which is an increase of 45 per cent more athletes and 73 per cent more medals compared to the parasport competition staged at the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games.

"I am also pleased to announce there will be an equal number of men's and women's events across all seven para-sports, highlighting the commitment to equality and inclusion at the 2018 Games."

Disability Services Minister Coralee O'Rourke said increasing the inclusion of people with disability in the Commonwealth Games was a step in the right direction towards creating equal opportunities for all Australians.

"People with disability should be supported to participate in and

contribute to all levels of sport, and I am pleased that this has been recognised in time for Gold Coast 2018," Ms O'Rourke said.

Events for para-athletes have been included in the Commonwealth Games since Manchester 2002. The Gold Coast 2018 Commonwealth Games will be staged from 4-15 April 2018.

Australian Blind Bowlers Association

Two major events in the 2016 ABBA calendar have been run and won since Easter. The Australian team visited Auckland, New Zealand to compete in the Trans-Tasman and the National Series,

Championships were held in Port Macquaire, NSW.

The Trans-Tasman Series was held from 28 to 30 April at the Brown's Bay Bowling Club, on the north side of the harbour in Auckland. The Australian team - eight Bowlers, Directors. eight and Coach/Manager Wendy Ferguson arrived in Auckland on 26 April, and used the following day to practise on the unfamiliar greens. For three players: Jayne Parsons of WA; and Backstrom and Seymour, both from Queensland; the Trans-Tasman was their first taste of international competition.

After а solemn ANZAC Day observance, competition was joined on the morning of 28 April. The team was made up of one male and one female bowler in each of four sight categories, B1, B2, B3, and B4. On Day 1, each member played a Men's or Ladies' Singles match in their respective categories in the morning session, and then combined in a Mixed Pairs game in The locals did the afternoon. slightly better on the day, and won six games to Australia's five, with one draw.

The same format was used on Day 2. The result was even closer. Both teams won six games, but New Zealand had the better shot difference: plus five. On Day 3, the Mixed Pairs were played in the morning, and the competition finished with the last Singles games. The visitors found their form and won eight games to four.

In a change from previous Series, it was announced that each day's play was a Test Match, and so the hosts won the Trans-Tasman Trophy; two Tests to one. International rookie Lynne Seymour, who won five of her six games, was declared (unofficially) Australia's best player, and was presented with a bottle of champagne.

In spite of Australia relinquishing the Trans-Tasman Trophy for only the second time ever, the series was a great hit-out for the team. The Players and Directors will continue prepare for the Championships, which will be held in Cape Town, South Africa in March 2017.

- Test 3: Australia 24 points, + 35, New Zealand 12 points, - 35
- Test 3 Winner: Australia

On 1 June, thirty-seven Players and their Directors from five states gathered at the Port City Bowling Club in Port Macquarie NSW for the 39th ABBA National Championships. This was a new

venue for the Nationals, and what a venue it was. The greens and facilities were first-rate, and the hospitality offered by the Port City members was simply wonderful. Apart from two days which were washed out by the infamous 'east coast low', the weather was kind, and the competition was spirited. Players competed in Men's and Ladies' Singles, Men's and Ladies' Pairs, and in Mixed Pairs.

After seven playing days, Queensland emerged as the overall winner. Every one of their fifteen Players won at least one Gold Medal; unprecedented an achievement. Jake Fehlberg, from Burleigh Heads on Queensland's Gold Coast, won every game he played, and took home three Gold Medals, Ron Humphry Perpetual Trophy for Best Male Player, and Gwen Lewis Cup for the Overall Individual Performance. Lynne Seymour, from the Thuringowa club in Townsville, won two Gold and a Silver, and the Ron Humphry Perpetual Trophy for the Best Female Player.

Queensland will host the 2017 National Championships at Coolangatta on the Gold Coast in May. Every state will be on the look-out for new bowlers to carry their colours into next year's event.

The Australian Open is being held on the Gold Coast in June. At the time of writing, the events for vision-impaired bowlers had not begun. There are nine men and eight women competing for prize money in Men's and Ladies' Singles, and in Open Pairs. The finals will be held at the Broadbeach Bowls Club on 23/24 June. New Zealand win Vision Impaired Trans Tasman trophy.

Rod Mills (NSW) and his caddy Kerry Eichner finished runner up with 35 points. Credit goes to Robert Curtin (SA) and his caddy Gus Bossenbury with Robert winning his first major trophy being the B3 winner with 34 points.

News from BGA - 2016 ISPS HANDA **World Championships**

BGA is delighted to advise that Australia has secured nine places for the 2016 ISPS HANDA World Blind Golf Championships to be held in Japan in November 2016. This is very encouraging for BGA as only 56 players are invited to compete in this event. A little over 25% of our active members will compete in this event.

BGA's team is based on finishing places in the 2014/15 Order of Merit which rewarded participation in and results from competing in the major tournaments (BGA Australian Open and Stableford Championships, **BGNSW** Open,

WABGA Open and BGV Open) staged each year in Australia over a two year period in 2014/15.

In 2016 the Inaugural Queensland Open will become an Order of Merit event. In addition, Australia has two current world champions who receive automatic invitations and an IBGA Board member who also receives an automatic invitation. The International Blind Association has set criteria that entrants in the 2016 World Championships must have handicap at or under the maximum for the 3 sight classifications and must have played in a minimum of 8 qualifying events in the 2year period up until December 2015.

Budgets and Plans

BSA Board has been developing its 2016-2017 financial budget and operational plan over the last couple of months.

Due to the need to rest its major revenue promotion – 'Scratch and Win', the next year will see some significant changes in how BSA will be structured operationally, and also how it will be able to support BSA members.

Operationally BSA will have a parttime Sports Development Officer, and casual Administration Officer.

The Sports Development Officer will be dedicated at servicing members driving and the development of all blind sports, including 'new' sports such as football and tennis. It is envisaged that this resource will deliver member organisations will greater support than they have had in the past.

Also Stephen Barnes, Acting CEO will reduce his time working with BSA and be focusing on BSA strategic matters at a national and international level.
